



Cover: One of the Met's spectacular acquisitions of the 1960s is *The Fortune Teller* by Georges de La Tour. Dating before 1733, it is one of the rare signed works by this still little-known master. Its purchase created a scandal in France and the government conducted an investigation of the Fine Arts bureaucracy to discover how such a National Treasure had been allowed an export license. André Malraux personally announced his displeasure, and the picture was on the front pages for months. This month the Metropolitan Museum itself, celebrating its 100th anniversary, is making news; a discussion of its situation begins on page 27.
