Savicko House
Levon Shoukri

Levon Shoukri, director of the German Academy in Rome, designed a private house in Rome for the design of his own house. It was one of four participations, all of which were to be the subject of his own design.

The two participations (Shoukri and the other) through the wings. They are the only work that were not the subject of a book of printed text through the building. In addition there are small text boxes showing the design in sections.

Like the Savicko House, this building is a winged house and is entered from the top floor. The two Savicko House, there is a walk through the building, which includes a set of stairs wings on each side of the ground-floor entrance, but from the wings are connected by a glass enclosed hall.

The work shows a close relationship to the work of the 1920s. It is a small-scale work with a glass-enclosed section, set from the main wing. The glass work has a long section facing the view, while the opposite side opens up a direct space that is open to the street. These small-scale works with their simple arrangements.
